

The new appointment will work with our remaining convenors, Mike Bracher, Allison Hui and Yiu-Tung Suen, to make sure that student members of the Association are kept up-to-date with matters of specific interest to them. They will also facilitate contact between student members and the BSA Council. In return for their hard work and dedication, Postgraduate Forum Convenors are offered free places at BSA events and all travel expenses are reimbursed.

The Convenors' tasks include:

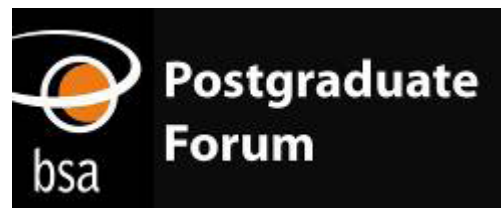

Welcome to another edition of PG Focus - bringing you news, interviews, and showcasing postgraduate sociological research.

In this edition we are very pleased to welcome Neera Chandhoke - professor in the department of political science at Delhi University (India) - and plenary speaker at the 2010 BSA Annual Conference.

This is the first of two parts of a conversation which was recorded at the Conference. In part 1 - Neera Chandhoke speaks with Srila Roy on the topics of:

*Postcolonial developments in Indian social science.

*Contemporary conceptions of civil society and political engagement in the Indian context.

*NGO's, accountability and the state.

Professor Chandhoke is Director of the developing countries research centre at Delhi University, and the current president of the Asian political and international studies association. She is the author of:

*2003, *The Conceits of Civil Society*, Delhi, Oxford University Press

*1999, *Beyond Secularism: The Rights of Religious Minorities*, Delhi, Oxford University Press

Her current work is an exploration of the right of secession.

Srila Roy is a Lecturer in Sociology & Social Policy at the University of Nottingham. Her interdisciplinary research interests draw on feminist theory, cultural studies, psychoanalysis, postcolonial and anthropological work. In substantive terms, Srila's work explores issues of gender, postcolonial feminism and feminist theory, cultural memory, violence and trauma, and the affective economies of social movements and everyday life; with a regional specialism in India and South Asia.

An increasing number of patients are surviving an episode of critical illness that requires intensive care (ICU) treatment. Recovering from critical illness is a long-term process and ICU survivors and their families face many challenges after critical illness. A number of disciplines have an interest in critical illness and recovery and research collaborations across disciplines have the potential to improve health care practices, and inform social science theory and methodological developments.

This international and multidisciplinary summer school aims to:

- Build international collaboration
- Create networks of early career and senior researchers
- And provide high quality methods teaching opportunities.

The summer school is aimed at international early career, doctoral (2 year onwards) and postdoctoral researchers from both social science and practice-based health care. An early career researcher is defined as a person who has held an MPhil, MD or PhD degree not longer than 5 years.

F. Villains, Rogues and Deviants: Writing the Histories of People We'd Rather Forget Postgraduate and Early-Career Researchers Conference 22 October 2010 at the University of Edinburgh

This conference will focus on the unique challenges and benefits of researching and writing about forgotten, immoral, ignored and disliked individuals, groups and ideas at any time in history. The keynote address will be given by Dr. Louise Jackson of the University of Edinburgh. Dr. Jackson will be examining the continued popularity of convicted offenders' biographies since the early modern period.

Special consideration will be given to proposals addressing the following themes:

- Demonized political groups, parties, and leaders
- Changing perceptions of criminal and non-criminal behaviour
- Dangers of applying current social norms to the past
- Romanticization of roguery

Speakers are encouraged to address how their research subjects have been viewed over time as society's morals and ethics change. Some subjects have been intentionally ignored because of their viewpoints or actions. Who is considered to be a villain, rogue or deviant? What makes them so? And how did ethical frameworks shift over time to change society's views of these people?

Postgraduates and early-career researchers will have an opportunity to voice their concerns and discuss the challenges they face in their own research. Scholars of subjects that are viewed negatively by society at large must justify their chosen topics, approach them with objectivity, and demonstrate why they are worthy of study.

We welcome proposals from postgraduate students and early-career researchers in all disciplines for twenty minute papers on any topic related to the theme. Travel bursaries will be available for speakers coming from outside of Edinburgh, contingent upon funding.

G. Panic and Mourning: A Graduate Conference, Portuguese Catholic University, 28-29 October 2010

Panic and mourning are two distinct emotional constructs that often intersect and interplay in landscapes of conflict, violence, crisis, tragedy and catastrophe, both natural and man-made. Whereas panic tends to occur during the experience of the catastrophic events, mourning, on the other hand, relates to the aftermath of a violent disruption and to the way humans try to make sense of it retrospectively. Conversely, violent events can also leave a thread of panic in its aftermath, such as mourning can be disturbed or reinstated by a catastrophic occurrence.

This inter-disciplinary conference seeks to address questions at the interface of panic and mourning, both individually and jointly. We are particularly interested in investigating representations and performances of modalities and contexts of panic (fear, horror, terror, rage, anxiety, shock, threat) and mourning (pain, grief, loss, trauma, memory, melancholy, nostalgia, healing) in media, literary and cultural frameworks.

This conference wishes to bring together doctoral students, Post-doc and junior researchers from different areas and disciplines to share research interests and works-in-progress, learn and engage in fresh intellectual discussion with international key academics and build a community of young scholars.

Papers are welcome on the topics listed below, amongst others:

- The cultural construction of panic and mourning
- Representations of panic and mourning in literature and the arts
- Mediation and the mediatization of panic and mourning
- Panic and mourning as spectacle
- Tropes of panic and mourning between victimhood and agency
- Public and private rituals of panic and mourning
- Gendered discourses of panic and mourning
- The work of law in practices of mourning
- Transgenerational mourning and the heritage of collective loss
- Dimensions of panic: moral panic, technopanic, hyperpanic, media panic, voluptuous panic, global panic
- Power, governmentality, and the regulation of emotions

H. Foucault, the Family and Politics, University of Cambridge, 12 November 2010

BSA Theory Study Group supported Conference

Foucault writes of how the internal power-dynamics of the family interact with the social politics of society as a whole. On the one hand, social politics impact family structure and dynamics in many ways, including legal judgements, medical interventions, and social work. On the other hand, members of families call on discourses and institutions from society at large in order to manage or change the operation of the family. The conference will begin by examining the theme of the family in Foucault's life and texts; it will then use his ideas to explore the politics of the family more generally in the contemporary world.

I.CALL FOR PAPERS - BRICS on the Move, Centre for Mobilities Research, Lancaster University, 12 November 2010

Workshop Organisers: Thomas Birtchnell, David Tyfield & John Urry, CeMoRe
The acronym BRICs (Brazil, Russia, India, China) was coined by the Goldman Sachs consultant Jim O'Neill in 2001. It has since become a common umbrella term in media, academic and government rhetoric about the future potential of these 'emerging giants', in particular the threat/opportunity that these economies present to the developed world. The regionalised perspective of BRICs encourages a commodified picture of these countries around major risks/opportunities: investment, global hegemony, social transformation and climate change. The BRICs is the West/North's dream of a new East/South with geo-political status and power to rival the developed world. Indeed, much BRICs discourse echoes Cold War rhetoric, which in turn resonates with the unspeakable commonality (for investors at least) that all four of the BRICs were (or remain, in title) socialist states.

Against such a limited understanding of the BRICs, this one-day conference will explore three inter-related issues regarding which they may be said to be 'on the move'; first, their (individual national and/or collective) geopolitical rise and its global impacts; secondly, the ongoing and parallel historical process of (concerted) construction of the BRICs as a social and political reality; and, thirdly, the role of increased mobility (inter- and intra-nationally) in constituting these rapidly changing societies.

To represent these countries as a unified group belies each country's own set of economic, social and political relations, both intra-nationally and with their regional neighbours and the developed world. This denies, inter alia, the socio-historical cross-border exchanges that encouraged the emergence of these countries. The flows of remittances, migration, innovation, knowledge, technology and talent that constitute disorganised capitalism go under the radar of conventional commentaries on BRICs. Strange couplings and contradictions also emanate from this new geo-political ordering. There is thus great potential for social scientists to challenge the conventional usages of such blanket terms by offering concrete examples of how global complexity within which, and mobilities by which, these nation-states emerged disrupt and deconstruct convenient acronyms like BRICs. The mobile turn in sociology can thus temper reports in the media and finance of threat and opportunity that feed into government strategies and foreign policy, thereby challenging the stark and binary choices between dystopic futures posed by this conventional framing.

Papers and presentations are invited on topics on themes such as:
* Automobility and the emerging powers;

- * Case studies on individual BRICs countries and mobilities issues;
- * Global impact of BRICs-based innovation, including for socioeconomic development;
- * Transnational elites, migration, tourism, remittances, capital flows, trade;
- * Socio-political history of BRICs or related global quasi-institutions;
- * Media representations of BRICs in terms of emerging powers/giants rhetoric;
- * Low carbon innovation/technology/knowledge transfer and the impact of the BRICs on climate change mitigation and adaptation;
- * Critiques or sociological analyses of the prevailing finance/economic focus on investment, economic growth, risk and carbon emissions in understandings of BRICS

Abstracts should include a title, contact details of the author(s) (name, postal address, email) and a summary of no more than 300 words. Please submit abstracts to the organisers (t.birtchnell@lancaster.ac.uk) no later than 1 September 2010. The workshop will be held at Lancaster University on 12 November 2010 from 11am to 6pm.

For centuries congestion has constituted a significant part of the travelling experience of peoples within and between cities, regions and nations. Meanwhile, for governments and planners, congestion has emerged as both a technical and cultural construct, influencing the interaction and circulation of populations and the ways in which transport and related infrastructures have developed. Societies have devised new methods and ways of dealing with mobility and congestion, ranging from discouraging the use of motorcars in central areas (such as the congestion charge in London) to the construction of state-of-the-art infrastructures and sophisticated mapping and forecast models.

The aim of the conference is to examine the ways in which congestion has been, and continues to be, a problem as well as an inherent characteristic of the historical development of cities and regions worldwide, particularly in their relationship with commercial, financial, industrial, tourist and other networks. Our purpose is also to promote an exchange across disciplines and engage with current policy debates.

We welcome proposals relating to any historical period and geographical area examining congestion in its broadest sense and/or focusing on one of its multiple dimensions. Themes that might be
