Crime Review of 2016

There has been little activity in the Scottish Study Group in 2016. The Convenors are currently considering how to take the group forward and a request for new convenors was posted to the BSA website and in the e-newsletter in February 2017. One person has responded to this and Liz will follow this up to see if this will put a new team in place to encourage more activity for this group.

One of the difficulties is that there is no 'Scottish sociology' as such. Thus a Scottish Study Group could take as its focus the range of sociological research and teaching being conducted in Scotland. This would make it more akin to a regional study group which could mirror the themes which occur at BSA level.

The JISC mail list continues to be used to post items of interest such as events, PhD opportunities and current vacancies but there is little discussion on wider topics or issues. It is therefore more like a notice board with information going in one direction – from the convenors to the list.

The twitter account is still live but nothing has been tweeted for a while. However this could easily be revived if was thought useful to promote events or news items.
