Associate Board 2019 - 2021: Call for New Members

Deadline for Applications: 30 October 2018, 17:00 (GMT)

Work, Employment and Society invites applications to join its Associate Board. The Associate Board is a flexible way for individuals to become involved in the ongoing success of the journal, which does not require the same time commitment as membership of the Editorial Board.

We are recruiting **5** new Associate Board members this year. Successful candidates will become members of the Board from January 2019, for a period of three years.

Associate Board Composition and Operation

The WES Associate Board is made up of 30 scholars, both junior and senior academics, who commit themselves to reviewing **up to 10 papers** a year for the journal.

The Associate Board is a 'virtual entity' and does not require attendance at board meetings.

Being a member of the Associate Board means being professionally associated with *Work, Employment and Society*, one of the most highly-regarded journals in its field.

Eligibility

The Associate Board is open to both junior and senior academics with a **PhD**, or equivalent, in any area covered by the journal or in a relevant subject. International and UK applications will be considered. You do not need to be a member of the BSA to apply for a position on the Associate Board; however successful candidates are required to join the Association.

Candidates should provide evidence of **publication in a peer review journal** (particular preference for articles in WES) and of their **experience of peer reviewing** in their applications.

WES is not able to accept candidates from the same institutions as the Editorial Team (Middlesex University and Birkbeck). In addition to this, there cannot be more than two members of the Associate Board from the same institution at any given time – this currently applies to King's College London and the University of Southampton.

The Associate Board requires members with a broad range of expertise, although preference will be given to those whose expertise is in demand by the journal. The following areas of expertise are particularly needed:

- Disability and/or mental health
- Health and social care
- Labour markets
- Development studies/Global South
- Migration
- Digital studies
- Diversity
