5. Review of Year:

The Sport Study Group has continued to attract a steady flow of new recruits – up from 143 (February 2015) and now stands at 249 (May 2023). The decision to allow non-BSA members to join the group via the jisc mail list may explain the increase in membership numbers. From April 2017 the study group has been convened by Mark Doidge (Brighton). From September 2018, Mark was joined by Dr Aarti Ratna (Northumbria).

6. Key Activities during year 2021 - 2022:

There has been limited activity since Covid, partly as things settle after covid. Some conversations have taken place with active members about relaunching some online sessions or hosting a regional event. This will be on either teaching sociology of sport or activism in sport. There were dedicated sessions on sport at the BSA annual conference.

7. Concluding Remarks:

The study group remains fairly active in its 28th year. The first year of covid in 2020 led to a flurry of activities, but these have tailed off in 2021. Returning to face-to-face conferences brought the return of the business meeting at the annual conference in Manchester 2023.
