## **Review of the year:**

- We regularly maintain the study group Twitter / X account which has over 1,400 followers. This helps to maintain the profile of the study group, and links with other BSA study groups.
- We also have an active Jiscmail list and circulate relevant messages when received.
- On 10th July 2024 convenor Claire Markham organised and led an in-person all day event on the topic of 'Drinking spaces: Past, Present and Future' at Rock Brewery Canal House, Nottingham. The event was in collaboration with the Drinking Studies Network 'drinking spaces' cluster.

The event included a keynote presentation from Dr James Kneale, University College London, and ten oral presentations from established academic researchers, early career researchers and people working in roles relevant to study group outside of academia These presenters included: Alexa Ridgeway, Megan Bennett, Paul Wilson, Victoria Wells, Thomas Thurnell-Read, Robert Deakin, Claire Markham, Emily Nicholls and Lisa Riemer.

The event was attended by almost 30 delegates from across the UK and was a lively and motivating event. It was great to get together in-person after the two events we ran online during and immediately following the period of the COVID-19 restrictions.

- Following this event in July 2024 Claire Markham stepped down from her role as convenor to dedicate her time to other work and projects. We are now in the process of advertising for another convenor to take on this role.
